

- 2. Align our financial resources to achieve the objectives of our strategic plan.





EMPLOYEE HIGHLIGHTS

- Daniel Leingang was named Dean of Academic Affairs replacing long-time dean Janelle Masters who retired. Leingang has been with BSC since 2000.
- Nita Wirtz, BSC assistant professor of psychology, and Stacie Iken, chief institutional
 effectiveness and strategic planning officer, were named to the North Dakota Women's
 Leadership Network.
- Kari Knudson, vice president NECE, was named one the top 25 women in business in the Northern Plains by Prairie Business magazine in March.
- Andrew Miller, director of choral activities and assistant professor of music, was selected recently as Commissioned Composer by the North Dakota Music Teachers Association.
- For the first time, two Jack Fellowships were given out. Janet Dixon, resource development manager, and Karen Erickson, director of Admissions and Enrollment Services each received \$25,000 from the BSC Foundation toward their education.
- Six Bismarck State College faculty members were granted tenure by the State Board of Higher Education in early May. All earned the rank of associate professor. Tenure candidates were Elizabeth Braunagel, associate professor of mathematics; Greg Hutzenbiler, associate professor of electrical lineworker; JoDe Knutson-Person, associate professor of chemistry; Jason Lueder, associate professor of graphic design and communications; Tony Musumba, associate professor of physics; and Tyler Schau, associate professor of agriculture, technology and natural resources.
- Kristina Wells was recognized in the Bismarck Tribune 40 under 40 top business professionals in North Dakota in 2014.



COLLABORATION

- Working in collaboration with Dickinson State University, Williston State College and TrainND, BSC began offering professional development and workforce training classes in Dickinson. The classes are taught on the DSU campus by TrainND instructors from BSC and WSC.
- BSC expanded its 20th annual ChoralFest to include junior high students in addition to area high school vocalists and BSC singers. The two-day activity offers a college-level music experience with professional instruction and performance opportunities for area youth.
- The BSC Embracing Diversity Committee hosted Cory Schneider, an LGBTQ educational consultant and psychotherapist from Los Angeles, to address LGBTQ issues with parents and educators.
- Middle and high school students attended the first BSC Tech Camp in June where they explored careers in the technology industry. Activities included hands-on networking, Web development and computer programming.

STUDENT HIGHLIGHTS

- For the sixth year in a row, BSC's surgical technology students achieved a 100 percent pass rate in the national Certified Surgical Technologist exam cycle for licensure.
- BSC's Dylan Horner of Mandan was one of seven North Dakota community college students named to the 2015 All-North Dakota Academic Team, which recognizes the academic achievements of community college students.
- The Mass Media program received two 2015 Apple Awards from the College Media Association -- Best TV Newscast for MystiCast and an award for Best Newspaper, two-year school, for the Mystician.
- McKenna Schmidt, Flasher, a student in the Agriculture Technology and Natural Resources (ATNR) program, was one of 10 students across the United States selected to attend the National Farm and Ranch Business Management Education Association National Conference in Salt Lake City in June.
- Five students in the Agriculture, Technology and Natural Resources (ATNR) program received national awards at the National Postsecondary Agriculture Student Organization (PAS) conference -- Caleb Mehlhoff of Wing; Kayla Grimm of Max; Brandy Koepplin of Elgin; Ashley Mutschelknaus of Elgin and Brandon Aldinger of Coleharbor.
- Mystic women's basketball team was co-Mon-Dak Conference Champions (9-3), and the men's and women's golf teams were Region XIII Champions and qualified for the national tournament. Two men's golfers qualified for the national tournament.

Three Bismarck State College students in the Graphic Design and Communications program won awards at the 2015 North Dakota Advertising Federation Awards. Danielle Schwartz (Bismarck) won a Silver ADDY award in the color photo category. Emily Johannes (Underwood) earned a Gold award for poster design and Kaleb Edmonson (New Rockford) received a Silver award in advertising logo. All are in their sophomore year.



BISMARCK STATE COLLEGE COMPLETES SMART GRID LABORATORY PROJECT

Bismarck State College's National Energy Center of Excellence recently completed a four-year project to demonstrate smart grid technology in 2015. The smart grid combines different sources of power generation, storage, and automation in order to provide the most reliable and efficient source of energy to the consumer.

Through the smart grid project, faculty and staff built a lab for students and industry to see how technologies like solar power, wind power and micro-grids operate in a smart grid.

"This online lab is the first of its kind to demonstrate new technologies to industry partners and students that they otherwise wouldn't have access to," says Kari Knudson, Vice President of the National Energy Center of Excellence.

Through the web-based lab, BSC energy students explore smart grid technology and control concepts. Faculty members will be able to incorporate the lab into existing coursework.



BSC DOCUMENTARY PREMIERED IN SEPTEMBER

Bismarck State College's documentary film, Celebrating 75 Years: The Story of Bismarck State College premiered on Dakota Media Access (DMA) Channel 12 in September 2014. It can be found on the BSC YouTube channel.

The documentary was produced as part of BSC's yearlong celebration of 75 years of education and community. The BSC production team interviewed 57 employees, alumni and friends of the college over the course of nine months. The documentary tells the story of how Bismarck Junior College, established in 1939, has grown into Bismarck State College, the third largest college in the North Dakota University System.

- BSC was ranked fifth among two and four-year institutions granting associate degrees in engineering technologies and engineering related fields in the August 18 issue of Community College Week, an independent, national publication covering community, technical and junior colleges.
- BSC integrated a new technology application into the training received by Nuclear Power Technology online students.
 Developers worked with computer programmers at Western Services Corp. of Frederick, Md., to create the Nuclear
 Pressurized Water Reactor online simulator (PWR). The simulator operates like a real nuclear plant and can be accessed
 from any computer anytime and anywhere. The design incorporates all plant systems, and online navigation exhibits
 the same fidelity and precision as simulators used by nuclear plants across the country.
- The North Dakota Young Professionals Network named BSC a runner-up in the 2014 Best Place to Work competition. While BSC has received several local awards from the Bismarck-Mandan Young Professionals, this was the college's first statewide recognition. BSC made the Bismarck-Mandan Top 10 Places to Work list in 2007, 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2012.





GRANTS PAVE THE WAY

Thanks to the generosity of our partners, endowments and donors, the BSC Foundation gave a total of \$1,718,863 in scholarships, grants and support to the college.

Federal Grants

College Advancement and the BSC Foundation pursue outside dollars from federal, state and private sources that usually support special strategic initiatives such as new programs, specialized equipment, new buildings and other major efforts. These funds are typically intended to be spent over the course of one to three years. Their impact to the college is immediate and long-lasting.

NEH Challenge Grant

In January, BSC landed a highly competitive \$500,000 National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Challenge grant, and, thanks to BSC Foundation donors Frank and Joanne Bavendick, the grant almost immediately achieved the required 2:1 match.

The resulting \$1.5 million BSC endowment will fund *Bringing Humanities* to *Life* – a project designed to meet the identified need in North Dakota for humanities-based workforce skills and lifelong learning. BSC faculty will have the opportunity to do research, try interdisciplinary collaboration, and incentivize their ongoing professional development as they deliver to the community.

TREND Grant

BSC, along with Williston State College, Sitting Bull College and Turtle Mountain Community College, shares a \$9.9 million grant from the U.S. Department of Labor to support job-driven technical programs related to energy, transportation and construction. Together the group formed the Training for Regional Energy in North Dakota (TREND) Consortium to develop and expand innovative training programs to address skilled labor shortages primarily in partnership with local employers.

The TREND Consortium received its first grant of \$14.6 million from the Department of Labor grant in 2012.

State of North Dakota Grants

Three program areas – Automotive Technology, Precision Agriculture and Energy – received almost \$500,000 in funding for equipment from the North Dakota Department of Commerce. The grant funding will enhance training capacity and required a dollar-for-dollar match with private industry funds.

Private Foundation Grants

Hess Corporation awarded BSC's Mechanical Maintenance program \$29,621 to purchase two hydraulic system trainers.

BNSF Railway Foundation awarded \$10,000 for expanding the training space in the Mechanical Maintenance program.

FOCUS ON HUMANITIES

From its earliest days, BSC has offered its students and the larger community the opportunity to attend and participate, in a rich and varied array of Humanities programs. Those offerings are one of the ways BSC goes beyond. In FY15, the campus produced, performed, promoted and otherwise supported:

• 9 visual art events • 12 vocal or instrumental performances • 6 plays • 9 visiting writers and presenters

Ongoing community programs including ArtsQuest, Booktalk, Conversations at BSC, Campus Read and the BSC Symposia.
