Course Description:

HUMS 211: Integrated Cultural Excursion - Inquiries into cultural phenomena experienced while traveling. This course allows students who participate in BSC-sponsored tours to earn college credit while exploring personages, places, institutions, or events during their travels.

Active Learning:

In addition to educational strategies such as reading, listening, and reflecting, when appropriate this class makes use of learning techniques commonly known as active learning. Students should expect to participate in active learning techniques such as discussions and presentations, small group activities, writing, problem-solving, movement, case studies, role-playing, etc. These activities promote analysis, synthesis, and evaluation of class content in order to improve student learning outcomes.

Grading Scale:

My definition of what grades mean is based on the following criteria:

The grade A is reserved for work that is of exceptional quality and showing unusual insight, initiative, and understanding. The work goes above and beyond the requirements of the assignment.

The grade B is awarded for work that is of superior quality and is consistently above the average. The work does significantly more than the requirements of the assignment.

The grade C indicates average performance. It is an acceptable and respectable grade. Assignment requirements are met.

The grade D is the lowest passing grade and indicates work below average. Assignment requirements are not met.

The grade F indicates failure. Work does not come close to requirements of the assignment.

Assignment Descriptions: The number of assignments and the credit for each assignment depends upon the level of credits chosen for the course. 05/21/2018 - 07/15/2018

Pre-Travel planner (Word Document). Everyone needs to create an advance-travel planner. This will include a list of sites you want to see in Edinburgh (where they are located and why you want to see them) as well as your choices for the two day-trips and why you've chosen them. Develop your schedule as a weekly planner identifying your daily activities. Don't "over-schedule" yourself. The places you list must be included in your daily travel journal. This should be e-mailed to me before May 15 – be as detailed/specific as you can – and please remember to explain WHY you have chosen to do certain activities.

Daily journal of the trip (Word Document or PowerPoint). You must include descriptions of daily activities (sketches that accompany the descriptions – or photographs - are encouraged), historically significant art and architecture, landscape, people, food, and entertainment. You may add such items as ticket stubs, photos, or other collage materials that can scanned and pasted into a document. This will be due (uploaded on Blackboard) by June 3.

Interpretive Paper: Your area of interest will determine your subject matter. If you are interested in art, choose an artist from one of the areas we will be visiting. If you are interested in history, traditions, politics, etc., choose a book/author from one of the areas we will be visiting. Do an interpretive paper

on what you read about in the book or about the artist you have chosen. For instance, you may want to write about the possibility of Scottish Independence. Perhaps you want to write about Scottish Castle architecture. Maybe you want to write about James Craig who designed the plan for Edinburgh's New Town area in 1766. Perhaps you're interested in 16th century Edinburgh goldsmith George Heriot, whose estate built Heriot's School near Greyfriar's Kirk. This paper will involve some research, but more importantly it will focus on your interpretation/understanding of what you have read. I want YOUR thought on the subject matter. This essay is due (uploaded on Blackboard) by June 17.

- **Response Paper**: This paper will be your response to one of the most interesting aspects of the trip. For example, you can do a compare/contrast with a place/tradition you visited and a related place/tradition in America. Or you may want to analyze Scotland's interest in / devotion to rugby. Or if you are interested in soccer, you could explore the "football" culture in Scotland (Edinburgh's teams are Hearts F.C. and Hibernian F.C.) compared to American football culture. This assignment is due (uploaded on Blackboard) by July 1.
- Both papers (Interpretive and Response) must follow this format: 4 to 5 full pages (works cited page required but not included in page length, title page NOT required); typed according to MLA formatting rules (double-spaced, 12 point Times New Roman font, 1" margins, etc.); Works Cited page (find/use/cite at least three sources and only one can be from a website; use books and library databases). Correct grammar and punctuation are an important part of your essay.
- **Participation / Responsibility:** Your level of responsibility and reliability towards others and yourself while on the trip. This includes your attendance at any scheduled meeting(s) I set up with the those taking this course.
- Due dates are firm. Ten% will be deducted from your essay score for EACH DAY that an essay is late.

 These points cannot be made up through revisions. NO WORK will be accepted more than one week past the due date no exceptions.
